Dr. Bob pg 102> Dr. Bob as we know, tackled what is now the Ninth Step of A.A. by consciously starting to make restitution to friends and aquaintances on the same day he took his last drink.

Dr. Bob pg 196 > Sister Ignatia, St. Thomas Hospital, Akron

Sister Ignatia made a point of helping her charges through their Fourth Step self-inventories, and told them how to take care of resentments and anger. She believed in the Ninth Step, making restitution, which she felt, even as she reminisced back in the 1950's, was not stressed as much as in the early days. "I can recall when some of those first men would come back to me after making their restitution," she said. "One told me, 'Do you know, I have the finest feeling. I feel that they are my best friends.,"

Sister Ignatia always made it a point to see what she could do to reconcile the family. "If it's the husband, I have the wife come in the day before he leaves. She'll say, 'Ijust don't want to see him. I'm finished with him.'

"Then I ask if she'll come and see me......

...This is not just a sobering up process. We wouldn't use valuable hospital space if we were in the business just to sober people up.

DR. Bob pg 191 > "We learned from experience that the program is defeated in institutions where the majority of inmates are repeaters," Sister said. "It creates an atmosphere of pessimism and discouragement."

Dr. Bob pg 192 >"Bob said there was the hard way and the easy way. The hard way was just by going to meetings. In five days a St. Thomas, you would hear as many talks as you would hear in six months outside.

Dr. Bob pg 199 > She was involved in the treatment on many thousands of alcoholics.... picked up the lingo also

Perhaps Bill said it well when Sister Ignatia told him she wanted her name kept out of the second Jack alexander article in the Saturday Evening Post.

"To be anonymous, sister, you'll have to take a little drink," Bill said.

Sister Ignatia's favorite quote was the divine paradox posed by the Apostle to the Gentiles: "But the foolish things of the world hath God chosen that He may confound the wise, and the weak things of the world hath God chosen that He may confound the strong, and the base things of the world and the things that are contemptible hath God chosen, and the things that are not, that He might bring to naught things that are; that no flesh shall glory in His sight."

BB pg 82 > sometimes we hear an alcoholic say that the only thing he needs to do is keep sober. Certainly he must keep sober.......

..... we feel a man is unthinking when he says that sobriety is enough.

AMENDS TO SELF...

Making amends to others, is to free me from my past, by making direct amends to those I have harmed so I can live free in the future.

BB pg 83 > The spiritual life is not a theory. We have to live it.

We should be sensible, tactful, considerate and humble without being servile or scraping. As God's people we stand on our feet; we don't crawl before anyone.

If we are painstaking about this phase of our development, we will be amazed before we are half way through. We are going to know a new freedom and a new happiness. We will not regret the past nor wish to shut the door on it. We will comprehend the word serenity and we will know peace. No matter how far down the scale we have gone, we will see how our experience can benefit others. That feeling of uselessness and self pity will disappear. We will lose interest in selfish things and gain interest in our fellows. Self - seeking will slip away. Our whole attitude and outlook upon life will change. Fear of people and of economic insecurity will leave us. We will intuitively know how to handle situations which used to baffle us. We will suddenly realize that God is doing for us what we could not do for ourselves.

Are these extravagant promises? We think not. They are being fulfilled among us - sometimes quickly, sometimes slowly. They will always materialize if we work for them.

We now have an understanding of step nine so we may begin practicing it as soon as possible. Agree????? ### end of 9

STEP 10

DAILY MAINTENANCE

Continued to take personal inventory, and when we were wrong promptly admitted it.

BB pg 84 p2 > This thought brings us to Step Ten, which suggests we continue to take personal inventory and continue to set right any new mistakes as we go along. We vigorously commenced this way of living as we cleaned up the past. We have entered the world of the Spirit. Our next function is to grow in understanding and effectiveness. This is not an overnight matter. It should continue for our lifetime. Continue to watch for selfishness, dishonesty, resentment, and fear. When these crop up, we ask God at once to remove them. We discuss them with someone immediately and make amends quickly if we have harmed anyone. Then we resolutely turn our thoughts to someone we can help. Love and tolerance of others is our code.

IF YOU ACCEPT STEP TEN, THEN YOU ARE RESPONSIBLE FOR THE THINGS YOU SAY, DO AND THINK.

bb PG 84 P3 >And we have ceased fighting anything or anyone - even alcohol. For by this time sanity will have returned. We will seldom be interested in liquor. If tempted, we recoil from it as from a hot flame. We react sanely and normally, and we will find that this has happened <u>automatically</u>. We will see that our new attitude toward liquor has been given us without any thought or effort on our part. It just comes! That is the miracle of it. We are not fighting it, neither are we avoiding temptation. We feel as though we had been placed in a position of neutrality safe and protected. We have not even sworn off. Instead, the problem has been removed. It does not exist for us. We are neither cocky nor are we afraid. That is how we react so long as we keep in fit spiritual condition.

The obsession to drink has been removed, AUTOMATICALLY, replaced with the opposite obsession to stay sober.

BB pg 85 p2 > It is easy to let up on the spiritual program of action and rest on our laurels. We are headed for trouble if we do, for alcohol is a subtle foe. We are not cured of alcoholism. What we really have is a daily reprieve contingent on the maintenance of our spiritual condition. Every day is a day when we must carry the vision of God's will into all of our activities. "How can I best serve Thee - Thy will (not mine) be done." These are thoughts which must go with us constantly. We can exercise our will power along this line all we wish. It is the proper use of the will.

STEP ELEVEN communicating with sunlight of the spirit

Sought through prayer and meditiation to improve our concious contact with God, as we understood Him.

SUGGEST PRAYER AND MEDITATION

BB pg 86 > When we retire at night, we constructively review our day. Were we resentful, selfish, dishonest or afraid? Do we owe an apology? Have we kept something to ourselves which should be discussed with another person at once? Were we kind and loving toward all? What could we have done better? Were we thinking of ourselves most of the time? Or were we thinking of what we could do for others, of what we could pack into the stream of life? But we must be careful not to drift into worry, remorse or morbid reflection, for that would diminish our usefulness to others. After making our review we ask God's forgiveness and inquire what corrective measures should be taken.

steps 4,8,9,5 ~~~~6 & 7 prayer.

Evening Prayer:

Lord God,

Please forgive my wrongs of today.

Please tell me what corrective measures I should take.

Evening mediation...

BB pg 86 >

On awakening <u>let us think about the twenty four hours ahead.</u> We consider our plans for the day. Before we begin, we ask God to direct our thinking, especially asking that it be divorced from self pity, dishonest or self seeking motives. Under these conditions we can employ our mental faculties with assurance, for after all God gave us brains to use. Our thought-life will be placed on a much higher plane when our thinking is cleared of wrong motives.

BB pg 86 >In thinking about our day we may face indecision. We may not be able to determine which course to take. Here we ask God for inspiration, an intuitive thought or a decision. We relax and take it easy. We don't struggle. We are often surprised how the right answers come after we have tried this for a while.

BB pg 87> We usually conclude the period of meditation with a prayer that we be shown all through the day what our next step is to be, that we be given whatever we need to take care of such problems. We ask especially for freedom from self will, and are careful to make no request for ourselves only. We may ask for ourselves, however, if others will be helped. We are careful never to pray for our own selfish ends. Many of us have wasted a lot of time doing that and it doesn't work. You can easily see why.

BB pg 87 > If circumstances warrant, we ask our wives or friends to join us in morning meditation. If we belong to a religious denomination which requires a definite morning devotion, we attend to that also. If not members of religious bodies, we sometimes select and memorize a few set prayers which emphasize the principles we have been discussing. There are many helpful books also. Suggestions about these may be obtained from one's priest, minister, or rabbi. Be quick to see where <u>religious</u> people are right. Make use of what they offer.

STEP 12 WORKING WITH OTHERS - chapter Seven

Having HAD A spiritual awakening as THEE result of THESE steps we tries to carry THIS message (of our spiritual awakening

following the big Book directions) to other alcoholics and practice THESE principals in ALL our affairs.

BB pg 89

<u>Practical</u> experience shows that nothing will so much insure immunity from drinking as <u>intensive work with other alcoholics</u>. It works when other activities fail.

Practical (NOT THEORECTICAL) experience.....

practical (NOT THEORETICAL) program of action.

BB pg 14 > My friend has emphasized the **absolute necessity** of demonstrating these principles in all my affairs. Particularly was it imperative to work with others as he had worked with me. **Faith without works was dead**, he said. and how appallingly true for the alcoholic! For if an alcoholic failed to perfect and enlarge his spiritual life through work and self-sacrifice for others, he could not survive the certain trials and low spots ahead. If he did not work, he would surely die. **Then faith would be dead indeed**. With us it is just like that.

BB pg 15 > When all other measures failed, work with another alcoholic would save the day.

It is a design for living that works in rough going.

... There is scarcely any form of trouble and misery which has not been OVERCOME among us.

BB pg 16 >An alcoholic in his cups is an unlovely creature. Our struggles with them are variously strenuous, comic and tragic. One poor chap committed suicide in my home. He could not, or would not, see our way of life.

BB pg 89 >Life will take on new meaning. To watch people recover, to see them help others, to watch loneliness vanish, to see a fellowship grow up about you, to have a host of friends this is an experience you must not miss. We know you will not want to miss it. Frequent contact with newcomers and with each other is the bright spot of our lives.

Don't start out as an evangelist or reformer. **Unfortunately** a lot of prejudice exists. You will be handicapped if you arouse it. Ministers and doctors are competent and you can learn much from them if you wish, but it happens that because of your own drinking experience you can be uniquely useful to other alcoholics. So cooperate; never criticize. To be helpful is our only aim.

BB pg 90 >When you discover a prospect for Alcoholics Anonymous, find out all you can about him. If he does not want to stop drinking, don't waste time trying to persuade him. You may spoil a later opportunity.

If there is any indication that he wants to stop, have a good talk with the person most interested in him usually his wife. Get an idea of his behavior, his problems, his background, the seriousness of his condition, and his religious leanings.

Then let his family or a friend ask him if he wants to quit for good and if he would go to any extreme to do so. If he says yes, then his attention should be drawn to you as a person who has recovered. You should be described to him as one of a fellowship who, as part of their own recovery, try to help others and who will be glad to talk to him if he cares to see you.

If he does not want to see you, never force yourself upon him. Neither should the family hysterically plead with him to do anything, nor should they tell him much about you. They should wait for the end of his next drinking bout. You might place this book where he can see it in the interval. Here no specific rule can be given.

BB pg 91 >Though you have talked with the family, leave them out of the first discussion. Under these conditions your prospect will see he is under not pressure. He will feel he can deal with you without being nagged by his family. Call on him while he is still jittery.

BB pg 92 >If you are satisfied that he is a real alcoholic, begin to dwell on the hopeless feature of the malady.

Doctors are rightly loath to tell alcoholic patients the whole story unless it will serve some good purpose. But you may talk to him about the hopelessness of alcoholism because **you offer a solution**. You will soon have you friend admitting he has many, if not all, of the traits of the alcoholic. If his own doctor is willing to tell him that he is alcoholic, so much the better.

BB pg 93 >Tell him exactly what happened to you. Stress the spiritual feature freely. If the man be agnostic or atheist, make it emphatic that he does not have to agree with your conception of God. He can choose any conception he likes, provided it makes sense to him. The main thing is that he be willing to believe in a Power greater than himself and that he live by spiritual principles.

Your prospect may belong to a religious denomination. His religious education and training may be far superior to yours. In that case he is going to wonder how you can add anything to what he already knows. But he will be curious to learn why his own convictions have not worked and why yours seem to work so well. He may be an example of the truth that faith alone is insufficient. To be vital, faith must be accompanied by self sacrifice and unselfish, constructive action. Let him see that you are not there to instruct him in religion. Admit that he probably knows more about it than you do, but call to his attention the fact that however deep his faith and knowledge, he could not have applied it or he would not drink, Perhaps your story will help him see where he has failed to practice the very precepts he knows so well.

BB pg 94 >On your first visit tell him about the **Fellowship of Alcoholics Anonymous.** If he shows interest, **lend him your copy of this book**.

BB pg 95 >If he is sincerely interested and wants to see you again, **ask him to read this book in the interval**. After doing that, he must decide for himself whether he wants to go on. He should not be pushed or prodded by you, his wife, or his friends. If he is to find God, the desire must come from within.

BB pg 96 >Do not be discouraged if your prospect does not respond at once. Search out another alcoholic and try again. You are sure to find someone desperate enough to accept with eagerness what you offer. We find it a waste of time to keep chasing a man who cannot or will not work with you. If you leave such a person alone, he may soon become convinced that he cannot recover by himself. To spend too much time on any one situation is to deny some other alcoholic an opportunity to live and be happy.

Suppose now you are making your second visit to a man. He has read this volume and says he is prepared to go through with the Twelve Steps of the program of recovery. **Having had the experience yourself, you can give him much practical advice.**

BB pg 98 >Job or no job--wife or no wife--we simply do not stop drinking so long as we place dependence upon other people ahead of dependence on God.

Burn the idea into the consciousness of every man that he can get well regardless of anyone. The only condition is that he trust in God and clean house.

BB pg 99 >

Let no alcoholic say he cannot recover unless he has his family back. This just isn't so. In some cases the wife will never come back for one reason or another. Remind the prospect that his recovery is not dependent upon people. It is dependent upon his relationship with God.

BB pg 100 >

Follow the dictates of a Higher Power and you will presently live in a new and wonderful world, no matter what your present circumstances!

BB pg 101 >

Assuming we are <u>spiritually</u> fit, we can do all sorts of things alcoholics are not supposed to do. People have said we must not go where liquor is served; we must not have it in our homes; we must shun friends who drink; we must avoid moving pictures which show drinking scenes; we must not go into bars; our friends must hide their bottles if we go to their houses; we mustn't think or be reminded about alcohol at all. Our experience shows that this is not necessarily so.

We meet these conditions every day. An alcoholic who cannot meet them, still has an alcoholic mind; there is something the matter with his spiritual status. His only chance for sobriety would be some place like the <u>Greenland Ice Cap</u>, and even there an Eskimo might turn up with a bottle of scotch and ruin everything! Ask any woman who has sent her husband to distant places on the theory he would escape the alcohol problem.

In our belief any scheme of combating alcoholism which proposes to shield the sick man from temptation is doomed to failure. If the alcoholic tries to shield himself he may succeed for a time, but usually winds up with a bigger explosion than ever. We have tried these methods. These attempts to do the impossible have always failed.

So our rule is not to avoid a place where there is drinking, if we have a <u>legitimate</u> reason for being there. That includes bars, nightclubs, dances, receptions, weddings, even plain ordinary whoopee parties. To a person who has had experience with an alcoholic, this may seem like tempting Providence, but it isn't.

You will note that we made an important qualification. Therefore, ask yourself on each occasion, "Have I any good social,

business, or personal reason for going to this place? Or am I exp	xpecting to steal a little vicarious pleasure from the atmosphere
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BB pg 102 >

Your job now is to be at the place where you may be of maximum helpfulness to others, so never hesitate to go anywhere if you can be helpful. You should not hesitate to visit the most sordid spot on earth on such an errand. Keep on the firing line of life with these motives and <u>God</u> will keep you unharmed.

BB pg 133 >

We are sure God wants us to be <u>happy</u>, <u>joyous</u>, <u>and free</u>. We cannot subscribe to the belief that his life is a vale of tears, though it once was just that for many of us. But it is clear that we made our own misery. God didn't do it. Avoid then, the deliberate manufacture of misery, but if trouble comes, cheerfully capitalize it as <u>an opportunity to demonstrate His omnipotence</u>.

- 1. Sense of duty.
- 2. It is a pleasure.

- 3. Because in so doing I am paying my debt to the man who took time to pass it on to me.
- 4. Because every time I do it I take out a little more insurance for myself against a possible slip.

Unlike most of our crowd, I did not get over my craving for liquor much during the first two and one-half years of abstinence. It was almost always with me. But at no time have I been anywhere near yielding. I used to get terribly upset when I saw my friends drink and knew I could not, but I schooled myself to believe that though I once had the same privilege, I had abused it so frightfully that it was withdrawn. So it doesn't behoove me to squawk about it for, after all, nobody ever had to throw me down and pour liquor down my throat.

If you think you are an **atheist, an agnostic, a skeptic, or have any other form of intellectual pride which keeps you from accepting what is in this book,** I feel sorry for you. If you still think you are strong enough to beat the game alone, that is your affair. But if you really and truly want to quit drinking liquor for good and all, and sincerely feel that you must have some help, **we know that we have an answer for you. It never fails**, if you go about it with one half the zeal you have been in the habit of showing when you were getting another drink.

Your Heavenly Father will never let you down!

Bob's amends < After leaving the hospital, Dr. Bob had set out to make the rounds of creditors and others he had previously avoided. He told them what had been going on, and expressed his desire to make amends. Following up on the statement he had made to Bill early that morning, he was doing what it took to get sober and stay that way. For Dr. Bob, a professional man, one of the greatest stumbling blocks had been his prideful need to conceal his drinking — from people who probably knew about it anyhow. He had only recently admitted to fellow Oxford Groupers that he was a secret drinker. Now, he openly admitted his problem to the very people he wanted to hide it from.

It was a difficult thing to do: "He trembled as he went about, for this might mean ruin, particularly to a person in his line of business."

when he came home that night, his entire outlook had changed. He was happy, and like Bill, he was finally a free man. It was June 10, 1935 -- now honored as the date when A.A. really began. The bottle of beer Bill had given him that morning was his last drink.

No temptation has seized you except what is common to man, and God is faithful; he will not let you be tempted beyond what you can bear, but when you are tempted, he will provide a way out so that you can stand up under it. **Romans 8:5-7** Those who live according to the sinful nature have their minds set on what that nature desires; but those who live in accordance with the Spirit have their minds set on what the Spirit desires. The mind of sinful man is death, but the mind controlled by the Spirit is life and peace, because the sinful mind is hostile to God. It does not submit to God's law, nor can it do so. Those controlled by the sinful nature cannot please God. And in the morning when we get on our knees again, God gives us just the load we are able to carry for that day."

"I remember one story he repeated over and over," said Ed. "It was about this boy who burned his hand. The doctor dressed it and bandaged it. When he took the bandage off, the boy's hand was healed. The little boy said, 'You're wonderful, doctor. You cure everybody, don't you?' 'No, I don't,' the doctor replied. 'I just dress the wound. God heals it.'"

Bill now joined Bob & Anne in the Oxford Group practice of having morning guidance sessions together, with Anne reading from the Bible. "Reading...from her chair in the corner, she would softly conclude, 'Faith without works is dead.' " As Dr. Bob described it, they were "convinced that the answer to our problem was in the Good Book. To some of us older ones, the parts that we found absolutely essential were the Sermon on the Mount, the 13th Chapter of First Corinthians, and the Book of James." The book of James was considered so important, in fact, that some early members even suggested "The James Club" as a name for the Fellowship.

This was a favorite quotation of Anne's, much as the Book of James was a favorite with early A.A.'s -- so much so that "The James Club" was favored by some as a name for the Fellowship.
